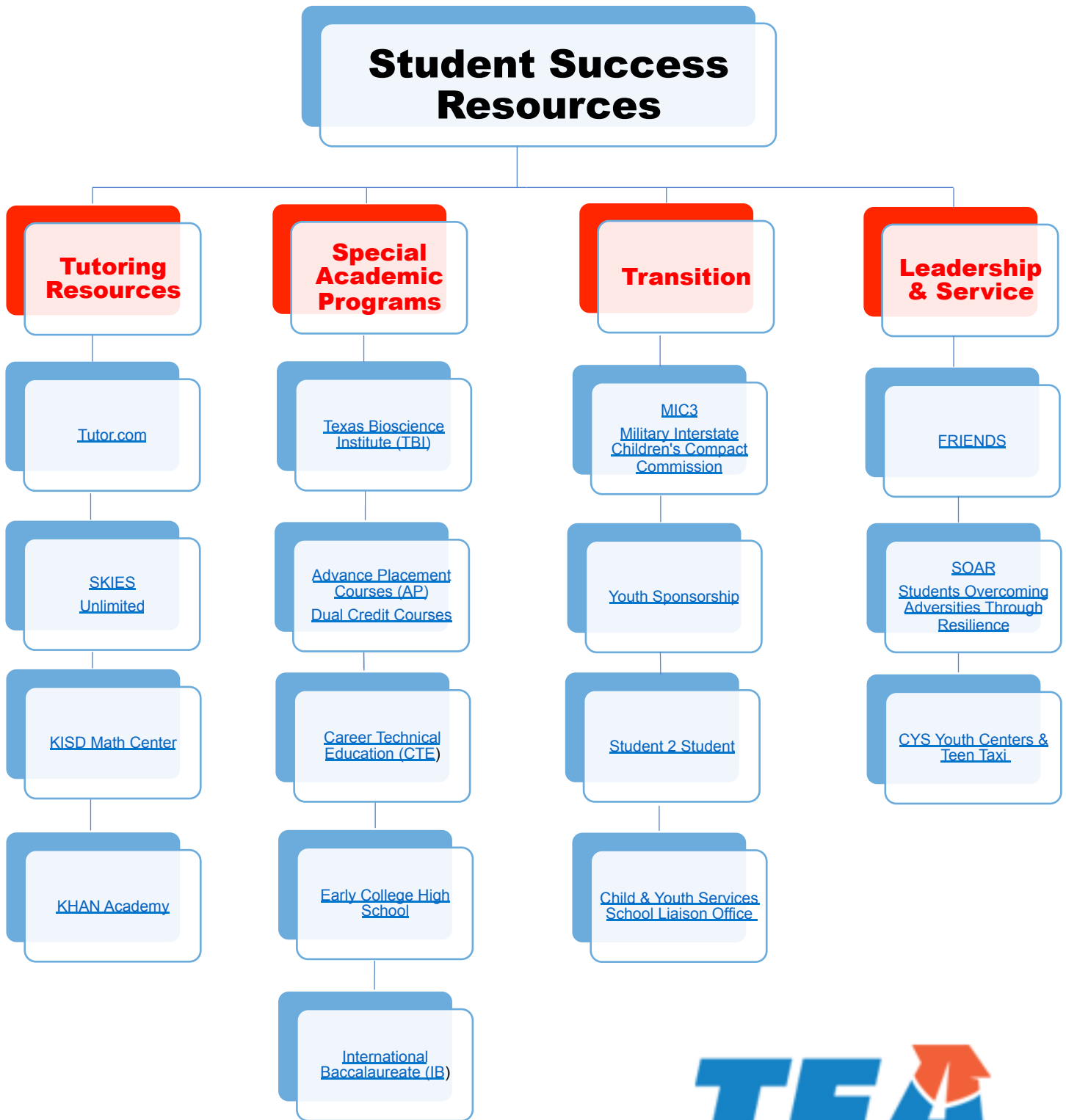


Fort Hood Child & Youth Services School Liaison Office Student Success Resources Flowchart

[Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission \(MIC3\)](http://www.mic3.net/) The goal of the Compact is to replace the widely varying policies affecting transitioning military students. The Compact leverages consistency, using a comprehensive approach that provides a consistent policy in every school district and in every state that chooses to join. The Compact addresses key educational transition issues encountered by military Families including enrollment, placement, attendance, eligibility and graduation. Children of active duty members of the uniformed services, National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders, commissioned officers of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the United States Public Health Service (USPHS), and members or veterans, who are medically discharged or retired for one year, are eligible for assistance under the Compact. <http://www.mic3.net/>

Leadership & Community Service

FRIENDS The Fort Hood Region Initiating Educational Networks and Developing Support Systems (FRIENDS) Initiative is an effort designed to connect military student leaders with the Fort Hood community and to develop leadership skills while addressing student-centered solutions to the challenges faced by military youth. Students are encouraged to utilize available resources and community partnerships to assist in education, transition, and deployment. FRIENDS takes a comprehensive approach to address these issues by collaborating with organizations and programs on Fort Hood and in the local community.

CYS Youth Centers & Teen Taxi Youth Programs provide safe, supervised options designed to productively engage youth. The Youth Program framework consists of multiple components designed to ensure the physical, cognitive, social and emotional needs of the youth are addressed. Youth Centers are open Monday-Friday after school until 8 pm and Saturdays from 12 - 8 pm. Local Youth Centers offer some amazing opportunities for youth, including youth sponsorship, computer/homework labs, exciting trips, robotics programs, sports, and healthy living. http://hoodmwr.com/cys_youthservices.htm

Special Academic Programs

Texas Bioscience Institute The Texas Bioscience Institute offers STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) based programs to promote a skilled and knowledgeable medical and biotechnology workforce in Central Texas. Advance Placement Courses (AP) and Dual Credit Courses Advanced Placement (AP) courses are offered to students while in high school. The students are provided rigorous academic coursework in the major subject fields at the college level. The core classes are usually offered within each high school, and with the successful completion of the AP exam at the end of the year, it will allow students to receive college credit(s) by many universities. Dual Credit courses are taught by professors at the college level. A student can receive their high school diploma as well as a multidisciplinary associate's degree by the end of a student's high school career. AP and Dual Credit classes are offered daily as a part of their class schedule.

Career Technical Education (CTE) Career Technical Education (CTE) offers numerous students the opportunity to qualify students to receive a certification while pursuing their High School diploma. CTE offers post-secondary education, and different skill options for students in High School. This program engages students in relevant, and up-to-date knowledge of their chosen field, through classroom and hands on instruction. The CTE program is committed to prepare all students for initial employment through, technical, manipulative, safety and academic skills.

Early College High School

Through the implementation of a full, innovative, rigorous, comprehensive education program, Killeen ISD will provide superior learning opportunities so that upon graduation, students are prepared for success in the workforce and/or in higher education.
