



Before the move to Arrival at your new Duty Station

Before the Move:

- 1. Contact your local CYS School Liaison Office to:
 - □ Receive Contact information for your new School Liaison Officer.
 - □ Have your student assigned a Youth Sponsor.
 - Be connected to the gaining installation School Liaison Officer, so you are aware of program deadlines, requirements and enrollment procedures.
- 2. Contact your student's current school to:

□ Pick up unofficial transcripts and or current special education information, if applicable.

□ Have current teacher fill out the teacher information sheet.

Arrival at your new Duty Station:

1. Contact your CYS School Liaison Office at the Installation to sit deskside with your CYS School Liaison Officer to get information on:

□Your student's zoned school, private school or homeschool information.

□School calendars and start times.

Tutoring available, curriculum or credit information.

□Sports and extracurricular activities

Get connected with EFMP if needed,

□Receive enrollment information for before and afterschool programs to include hourly or daily care.





School FAQ's

WHAT DO I NEED TO REGISTER MY CHILD FOR SCHOOL?

Documents required for registration:

- Birth certificate
- Immunization records
- Report card/transcript from losing campus
- Social security card
- Proof of income if applying for free or reduced lunch
- $\hfill\square$ Valid identification of the parent/guardian enrolling the student
- D Proof of residence (utility bill, lease, privatized housing assignment letter)
- 504, IEP, Dyslexia, Gifted and Talented or Bilingual information

WHERE WILL MY CHILD ATTEND SCHOOL?

School zoning is based on your home address. You may request a transfer to another campus. When determining whether to approve a transfer, ________ considers space availability, grades, and attendance. WHAT TYPE OF STATE ASSESSMENT IS USED IN TEXAS?

The State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR[™]) is an assessment program designed to measure the extent to which students have learned and are able to apply the knowledge and skills defined in the state-mandated curriculum standards, the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) <u>http://www.tea.state.tx.us/student.assessment/staar/</u>

STAAR assessments are administered for Grades 3–8 mathematics Grades 3–8 reading Grades 4 and 7 writing Grades 5 and 8 science Grade 8 social studies Algebra I, English I, English II, Biology, and U.S. History

WHAT IS THE CORE CURRICULUM FOR THE DISTRICT/STATE?

WHAT ASSESSMENTS ARE ADMINISTERED TO STUDENTS RECEIVING SPECIAL EDUCATION?

The Admission Review and Dismissal (ARD) committee–IEP committee- determines which assessment is appropriate for each student based upon his/her needs.

This critical information outlines the appropriate use of accommodations for students with disabilities. For the purposes of the statewide assessments, students needing accommodations due to a disability include:

• a student with an identified disability who receives special education services and meets established eligibility criteria for certain accommodations.

• a student with an identified disability who receives Section 504 services and meets established eligibility criteria for certain accommodations.

• a student with a disabling condition who does not receive special education or Section 504 services but meets established eligibility criteria for certain accommodations

IS PRE-KINDERGARTEN AVAILABLE?

Yes, pre-kindergarten 4 is available through your local school. A child must be 4 years old by 1 September of that academic year. Through Texas House Bill 1, children of active duty military and children of active duty members, killed or injured while on active duty qualify to attend. If you live on Fort Hood and are active duty your 3 year old can attend the Pre-K3 program. A child must be 3 years old by 1 September of that academic year.

WHAT IS THE AGE REQUIREMENT FOR KINDERGARTEN?

A child must be 5 years old on or before 1 September of that academic year.

According to The Military Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children "The Compact", once a student begins Kindergarten they shall be allowed to continue enrollment at the grade level from the sending state regardless of the age provided the student completes the prerequisite grade level at a Local Education Agency (LEA) in the sending state.

WHAT ARE THE IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS?

IS BUS TRANSPORTATION PROVIDED?

Residents must be two or more miles from the campus or be in a school board designated hazardous traffic area if less than two miles. Students whose IEP states transportation is authorized are qualified. Students attending a special program such as a magnet or Early College High School are also qualified.

CAN I RECEIVE EMERGENCY ALERTS FROM MY CAMPUS?

Yes, every district has an emergency alert system where parents can receive alerts and updates via text or email. Check with your campus when you register.

WHAT ASSESSMENTS ARE ADMINISTERED TO STUDENTS RECEIVING SPECIAL EDUCATION?

The admission, review, and dismissal (ARD) committee makes educational decisions for a student with a disability, including decisions related to state assessments and decisions related to graduation requirements as described in Texas Administrative Code (TAC) §89.1070. The ARD committee will:

- Determine whether a student will take STAAR with or without allowable accommodations.
- Review the participation requirements for STAAR Alternate 2 for students with significant cognitive disabilities who

access the grade-level Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) curriculum through prerequisite skills.

- Review the participation requirements for TELPAS Alternate for English learners (ELs) with significant cognitive
- disabilities.

Communicating with your students teachers and how to request a conference



When should I talk with my child's teacher? Early and Often. Contact your child's teacher or teachers the beginning of the year or as soon as you can. Get aquatinted and show your interest. If you notice a big change in your child's behavior, school performance or attitude during the school year, contact the teacher immediately.

Requesting a Conference: A conference may be requested by:

- Calling the school's main office and speak to one of the secretaries.
- Sending a note or an email to the teacher requesting a conference.

Getting the most out of a parent-teacher conference:

Be prepared to listen as well as to talk. It helps to write out questions before you leave home. Also jot down what you want to tell the teacher. Be prepared to take notes during the conference an ask for an explanation if you don't understand something.

In conferences, the teacher should offer specific details about your child's work and progress. If your child has already received some grades, ask how your child is being evaluated.

Talk about your child's talents, skills, hobbies, study habits and any special sensitivities such as concern about weight or speech difficulties.

Tell the teacher is you think your child needs special help and about any special family situation or event that might affect your child's ability to learn. Mention such things as a new baby, an illness or recent or upcoming deployment.

Ask about specific ways to help your child at home. Try to have an open mind

Be prepared to take notes during the conference and ask for an explanation if you don't understand something.

Think about what the teacher has said and then follow up. If the teacher has told you that your child needs to improve in certain areas, check back in a few weeks to see how things are going.
